Activity: Tuesday Activity

Type: Individual or Group Activity

Instructions:

We all want to feel included, we long to belong, we humans need to be accepted in a team before we can be heard, so essentially the first stage of psychological safety is simply being comfortable being present. This stage requires that all members are included and welcomed – without discrimination regarding gender, age, social background, sexual orientation, neurodiversity or anything else. Using the attached worksheet individually or as group discuss what makes you and your team feel safe or what contributes to a safe working environment in your unit. By understanding what makes feel us safe or unsafe we can better understand how to improve our safety culture for everyone.

With your team consider what belongs inside your circle of safety and what belongs outside of it. We have given you some examples of what you could include on the bottom of this sheet, along with some more information about the Circle of Safety. With a Circle of Safety, team members can rely on one another to strive towards their shared goals, even during the hardest times.
